Who can get a library card?

- Anyone who lives in incorporated Tinley Park or Orland Hills
- Anyone who owns or leases taxable residential or business property in incorporated Tinley Park or Orland Hills
- Individuals who live in unincorporated Tinley Park may apply for a non-resident fee card.

How to get your library card

When the library is open, stop by the Checkout Desk with your Illinois drivers license or state ID with your current address. If the address is not current, please provide a current utility bill addressed to the applicant. A parent's or legal guardian's signature is required on the application and library card of anyone under the age of 18.

OUR COMMUNITY & COVID-19

year has passed since the news about the global impact of the coronavirus began circulating, leading our library and other local businesses and organizations to close in the interest of public safety. Our Administration developed a Phased Reopening Plan that was approved by the Library Board of Trustees at its meeting on May 27, 2020. The plan has allowed us to easily adapt to the ever-evolving nature of the pandemic, while guaranteeing that we can still perform our core functions and do our best to meet the needs of the community.

In July, as the daily number of COVID cases began to dwindle, and the worst seemed to be behind us, the library reopened to the public. In September and October, our staff developed a plan and reservation system to reintroduce seating and study space however, as cases skyrocketed to record-breaking highs in November we were forced to remove public seating in compliance with the Tier 3 mitigations introduced by the state.

At the time of this writing there seems to be a light at the end of the tunnel—the daily caseload has dropped significantly since the fall, and the Cook County Department of Public Health has recently opened a COVID vaccination site at the Tinley Park Convention Center. Our Administration is actively consulting with the Village of Tinley Park and our Library Board of Trustees to determine what steps will be next for the library in responding to the pandemic.

When circumstances allow, you will once again be able to:

- Visit us during our regular hours of Monday-Friday,
 9 am-9 pm, Saturdays, 9 am-5 pm, and Sundays,
 12-5 pm.
- Sit and study in the library.

When physical distancing is no longer strongly recommended, limitations on gatherings have been fully lifted, and a vaccine is widely available, we will gradually reintroduce all pre-pandemic library services, including in-person events.

Despite the upheaval of 2020 and the crisis of the pandemic, Tinley Park remains an undeterred community of readers—just as an example, Tinley Park Public Library patrons checked out more 27,807 items in December 2020 as compared to 25,412 in December 2019. We can't say it enough—thank you for supporting us during this unprecedented, challenging time.

lthough the vast majority of residents in our service area have access to broadband internet (around 90%), roughly ten percent of households in Tinley Park and Orland Hills either have no internet access or a dial-up connection. With the pandemic forcing many businesses and organizations to move their operations online, this leaves about 6,000 households in our area with limited access to everyday essential activities, such as virtual doctor's appointments or placing grocery orders online. Part of our vision here at the library has

been to offer instruction and access to evolving technology. This has never been more critical than it is at the present moment-therefore, we are now offering Wi-Fi hot spots and Chromebook kits to help support internet connectivity in our community. In addition to providing convenient ways to get connected, we offer access to technology you might want to try before you buy, such as the Elgato Video Capture or Nintendo Switch. 





<u>Wi-Fi Hot Spots</u>


Home Delivery
