 A bunny searches the spring-time forest for a home of his own.
- E/Fiction Carle ***Ten Little Rubber Ducks*** by Eric Carle
 When a storm strikes a cargo ship, ten rubber ducks are tossed overboard and swept off in ten different directions.
- E/Fiction Cronin ***Giggle, Giggle, Quack*** by Doreen Cronin
 When Farmer Brown goes on vacation, leaving his brother Bob in charge, Duck makes trouble by changing all his instructions to notes the animals like much better.
- E/Fiction Dunrea ***Gossie*** by Olivier Dunrea
 Gossie is a gosling who likes to wear bright red boots every day, no matter what she is doing, and so she is heartbroken the day the boots are missing and she can't find them anywhere.
